Competition Summary NetSetGo

NetSetGo is netball's official starter program for kids aged 5-10 years old. This program provides players with the opportunity to learn netball basics, gain confidence, get active, make friends, and have fun in a safe and inclusive environment.

Registered NetSetGo Players will receive a participant pack upon redemption of their estore activation and store credit. This is administered by Netball WA, not LNA. All queries regarding participant packs should be sent to: netsetgo@netball.com.au.





<u>NetSetGo Skills – Year 1</u>

This starting point has children learning Netball skills via the use of fun based game activities. In Year 1, players do not need to form teams, participants join the LNA competition as individuals.

Participants should wear their NetSetGo T-Shirt (provided by Netball WA) or a comfortable shirt with either shorts, a skirt, leggings, or other comfortable attire. We recommend that participants wear appropriate footwear and bring along a drink bottle to each session.

NetSetGo Skills & Games – Year 2

This program builds on the skills learnt in Year 1 during the initial sessions with skills then progressing to a game situation. In Year 2, players do not need to form teams, participants join the LNA competition as individuals.

Participants should wear their NetSetGo T-Shirt (provided by Netball WA) or a comfortable shirt with either shorts, a skirt, leggings, or other comfortable attire. We recommend that participants wear appropriate footwear and bring along a drink bottle to each session.

NetSetGo Competition – Year 3

This competition starts with skills training provided by the Association and is then followed by game play under the NetSetGo modified rules.

Players are expected to change positions each quarter.

This is a team-based competition and players can choose to join as individuals (LNA will assist players to find a team), entity teams or join a club where they will be placed into a Club team.

NetSetGo Competition – Year 4

This competition is the next step up from the Year 3 competition and runs under the modified rules for the first half of the season with a progression to full netball rules in the second half of the season (except ring height which remains at the lower height).

This is a team-based competition and players can choose to join as individuals (LNA will assist players to find a team), entity teams or join a club where they will be placed into a Club team.

Both the Year 3 & Year 4 Competition engages modified rules to ensure children are not intimidated and can further develop their skills whilst having fun. The rules are modified as follows:

- a) 4 feet distance from a thrower
- b) Shorter ring height
- c) 5 seconds to throw the ball
- d) Players are permitted to shuffle on their feet
- e) Strict 1 on 1 defence
- f) The centre pass is taken by the team that did not score the last goal
- g) Scores are recorded unless both teams prefer not to but there is no ladder
- h) Coaches are allowed on the court to help the children. [Over the season we expect coaches to start to remain off the court as much as possible, but they are permitted to run along the side-line to help players as required]
- i) Umpires or other LNA officials are permitted to interfere with the game to give teams and players a chance to shoot a goal or spread out this is about helping kids to develop.
- j) Halfway through the season, Year 4 players transition to full netball rules

Primary School Competition

This competition has been designed to cater for girls and boys in Primary School Year 5-6. Teams playing in this competition are subject to grading and thus teams can be a mixed age but cannot be less than that of a Year 5 school child unless pre-approved by the committee.

This is a team-based competition and players can choose to join as individuals (LNA will assist players to find a team), entity teams or join a club where they will be placed into a Club team.

Grading will be based upon the team's ability and the number of grades will vary depending upon the number of teams nominated in the current season. In general, all efforts will be made to make sure grades are even and divisions will be targeted at between 4-8 teams each. Grading will usually occur over the first two weeks of the season, after which time divisions will commence, however, teams may rotate to allow for further development.

Playing times will usually fall between 8am and 1pm on Saturdays, depending on the number of teams each season.

Coaches are expected to rotate players through all positions evenly and give all players even court time. LNA will monitor this process and teams may be gifted special awards in recognition of their team spirit and fairness. LNA wants all players to have a fair, fun and fulfilling netball experience so as to maximise those players returning to netball in the following season and for years to come. We appreciate our coach's cooperation in this regard.

The season ends with a round robin followed by a presentation. Finals are not played in this competition and Most Valuable Player's (MVPs) are not nominated or awarded.



High School Competition (Incl Open Players)

This competition has been designed to cater for children in their High School years 7-12 plus any female <u>not at school</u> but turning up to 18 years of age or turning up to 19 years of age if playing in Division 2. Division 1 is open to any female competitor (of any age).

This competition is aimed at providing all participants with a fun, competitive, professional playing environment. Depending on the number of nominated teams each season, games will be played over a Thursday and Friday evening. Typically the highest division games will be played on a Friday evening with the balance played on a Thursday evening. Guarantees cannot be given for teams who have a preference of playing day, the final grading position will determine the day that teams will play.

Playing times will vary depending on the number of teams participating each season but will generally follow the following guidelines:

- ✓ 5 pm
- ✓ 6:15 pm
- ✓ 7:30 pm
- ✓ 8:45 pm (Fridays only and only if required)

Playing times and days are subject to change at the committee's discretion.

Teams are graded in this competition, thus teams can be a mixed age but cannot be less than that of a female Year 6 school child unless pre-approved by the committee.

Grading will be based upon the team's ability and the number of grades will vary depending on the number of teams nominated each season. In general, all efforts will be made to make sure grades are even and divisions will be targeted at between 6-8 teams each. Grading will occur over the first 2-3 weeks of the season after which divisions will be set unless there are compelling reasons to readjust the grading.

The season ends with a series of finals, followed by a presentation.

During the year, coaches will choose a Most Valuable Player (MVP) & Runner-up MVP for the opposing team after each game played.

Joining the Competition

LNA offers several options for players wishing to participate in our competition. Players can join an already established Club or form their own 'entity team'.

LNA welcomes all clubs to participate in our competition. LNA has several clubs that we are 'officially' affiliated with, with multiple other clubs/associations that also play at LNA on a regular basis.

Entity Teams


Entity teams are teams whereby participants form a team themselves with a minimum of 8 players (without going through a Club) by gathering friends or classmates. Entity teams must provide their own coach (with minimum Foundation Coaching Accreditation) and Team Manager. Entity teams are responsible for organising their own uniforms in accordance with LNA's uniform guidelines. We recommend that you choose colours that are not already represented within the LNA Competition.

Club participants should obtain registration details directly from their Club registrar.

Entity teams should initially register their team and then invite their participants to register using the PlayHQ supplied registration link.

Kidsport Funding



Eligible children in Western Australia can receive up to \$150 per calendar year to assist them to cover the costs of joining any approved KidSport Club. Vouchers can be used across multiple KidSport Clubs, helping more children to get active and connect with community sport.

To be eligible for KidSport, applicants must be:

- 1. Aged 5 to 18 years of age
- 2. Be a resident of Western Australia
- 3. Be Named on a valid Health Care Card or Pensioner Concession Card
- 4. Be registering with a KidSport approved club.

LNA and its affiliated clubs are all KidSport approved.

You must apply for your KidSport Voucher prior to registering in PlayHQ. You will need your valid voucher code to enter into PlayHQ when registering. You should apply for the voucher by selecting your CLUB (if applicable). If you are not affiliated/playing with a club, select Leschenault Netball Association.

LNA Fee Structure



Please note that participants only pay the Netball WA/Australia fees once season. If you are already registered for a different competition, then those fees do not apply and only the LNA Fees will be charged at the checkout point.

Grading Process & Fixturing

LNA has a Grading Committee and a comprehensive grading process to ensure that our competitions are even, as far as practicable. The grading process occurs across the first two or three playing days, which usually includes Mondays & Fridays (High School Competition) and Saturdays (Primary School Competition).

Teams are initially graded into groups based on the team's indicative division lodged at the time of registration, and the judgement of the committee based on prior history and other factors. Once this process is complete, the Court Administrator will publish the fixtures to PlayHQ.

Grading games involve two ten-minute halves with a 2 minute interval at half time. As grading games are played back-to-back, teams are encouraged to move onto their next court as soon as possible.

All teams and players must be available to play on every designated grading night, which is to ensure that the full team dynamics are assessed as part of the grading process. One player being absent may not impact the team's performance, but it that team is versing another team with players missing, this may have a significant impact on the overall grading process. It is imperative that coaches or team managers communicate any missing players to the Grading Committee as soon as possible to allow considerations to be made. We should be informed the players name, their usual playing positions and their skill and ability level.

Coaches are also requested to play their players in their usual playing positions wherever possible.

Following the first grading session, the grading committee reviews the results and determines the next round of team groupings. Some weekday teams (which the grading committee are confident about their placement) may not be called back to grading for the second round. This is to reduce the number of teams being graded and hence reduce the late game times.

The second round of grading fixtures are uploaded to PlayHQ as soon as possible following the grading committee's decision. We understand that last minute fixtures can cause some angst, but we require this time to check and double check our scheduling to avoid re-grading issues further into the season. We thank our members for their patience during this process.

Following the second grading session, the Grading Committee again reviews their results. Usually, only two sessions are required for Saturday teams. Weekday teams will only be required to attend a third grading night if the Grading Committee are undecided on where some teams should be placed.

Following the finalisation of Saturday team placements, fixtures are uploaded to PlayHQ for players to access.

Round 3 grading fixtures are also uploaded to PlayHQ. Following the third grading session, the Grading Committee again reviews their results and decides on finals divisional splits. PlayHQ is updated and the next round fixtures will be available on PlayHQ. LNA usually opts not to publish full fixtures at this time in case there are some final modifications to divisional splits. If coaches believe that their teams have not been placed into an appropriate division, they are welcome to contact the ADO to discuss the matter. The ADO will forward the concerns to the Grading Committee for consideration.

Please note that after due consideration, the Grading Committee's decision is final.

The Grading Committee will continue to monitor divisions in the coming weeks and reserves the right to adjust grades if required. Teams are not disadvantaged in this process.

If divisions of 8 (ie 8 teams per division) are allocated, after each team in that division plays every other team, the division may be split into two whereby the top 4 teams stay in the current division and the bottom 4 teams are moved down one division.

Splitting divisions results in a fairer competition for the second half of the season, and gives every team a chance to partake in finals.


Fixturing & Results – PlayHQ



PlayHQ is a cloud-based platform chosen by netball's governing bodies to be utilised to administer our competitions, including fixturing of games.

Players (or parents/guardians), can login to their PlayHQ profile and check the upcoming fixtures, once they have been finalised by the fixturing administrator.

Coaches and Team Managers can also view fixtures (and their team registrations and player's details), provided they have selected 'Management Access' at the time of registration.

Game Day Requirements - Scoring

Every team must have a team manager who is responsible for communicating to the team and for arranging a delegated representative to score each game. The team manager may choose to undertake their scoring responsibilities themselves, delegate to someone each week, or prepare a scoring roster. We recommend that all parents/carers volunteer to score a game as early as possible. The younger age groups games are a great way to learn as the game progress is usually slower, and it is easier to 'get the hang of it' during these games. LNA provides 'How to Score Guides' to assist scorers with this task.

A scorer from each team is required to be seated together ready to score prior to the game commencing. Scores must check at all players are listed on the score sheet (including fill-in or borrowed players) and complete positions for each player for every quarter. Scorers are also required to record cautions, warnings, and suspensions as well as centre passes.

One scorer is responsible for using the electronic scoring device, whilst the other is responsible for manually scoring each game on the supplied score sheet. The team listed first on the score sheet should generally undertake the scoring on the score sheet, however scorers can determine who takes on which role amongst themselves. Scorers should check with each other throughout the game to confirm that they have the correct score.

Fill-in Players

A fill-in player is a player who is registered in another team that plays at LNA in a lower division than their fill-in team. [Refer to By-laws for further clarification]. These players do not need to pay a fee at the court box, but their name, and usual team must be recorded on the score sheet in the 'fill-in players' section prior to the game commencing.


Borrowed Players

A borrowed player is a player who is not registered in the LNA competition. Borrowed Players must pay the relevant fee at the court box and obtain a receipt. The receipt must be attached to the score sheet, and the borrowed player's name must be completed on the score sheet in the fill-in players' section prior to the game commencing.

Electronic Scoring Devices

The electronic scoring devices are set up by the umpires. The team listed first on the score sheet is the HOME/LIGHT team, and the second team is the GUEST/DARK team, regardless of uniform colour.

To add a goal, simply press the 'Home' (Light) or 'Guest' (Dark) button once. Check the score entered by observing the score board at the end of the court and cross check this score with the manual score sheet.

Rollings Substitutions (Rolling Subs)

If you have scored in the Netball/Football Competition, you will be familiar with how to include rolling subs on the score sheet. If rolling subs are are new to you, we are here to help!

The below score sheet demonstrates how to show changes in positions for rolling subs.

A few tips/tricks:

- You only need to record the first rolling subs position change on the score sheet, irrespective of how many times players roll on or off
- If a player rolls off the court (and does not return) you must indicate this with a '-' (as per Amy Jones Q1 below)
- If a player stays in the same position for an entire quarter, show this by leaving the bottom section blank (as per Sienna Williams Q1 below)
- It is important to record rolling subs accurately due to the correlation to LNA's borrowed player rules and finals qualifications rules
- When recording rolling subs, it is helpful to know the names of each player on the team
- LNA encourages and expects fair and equitable court time for all players, and rolling subs will be monitored for fairness.

Most Valuable Player (MVP) Weeknight Competition Only

At the conclusion of every game, the Coaches will allocate MVP points to players from the opposing team.

The coach will record a '2' next to the MVP player's name, and a '1' next to the Runner-up MVP player's name.

Players who receive a warning during ANY game are ineligible for MVP Points.



Coaching

Coaches must be a minimum of 16 years of age. Coaches under the age of 18 require an adult team manager who attends most trainings and games. If they cannot be at a game, another adult must act in their place. It is also strongly recommended that all coaches have their team manager or another parent present during training sessions.

Coaches are required to ensure all LNA's By-laws are fully understood and form part of their coaching protocols. In particular, they are required to ensure all players understand they are to listen to the umpire and fully respect their decision. Coaches are also required to ensure all players understand umpire's hand signals. Coaches must remain stationary (sitting or standing) on the sideline* within your bench area and cannot move up and down the sideline. Due to central timing, no coaching can take place during injury time and players must stay in their positions.

*NetSetGo games do allow coaches on court, however, this should be kept to 1 coach per team, and they must try to not interfere with play. After 4 weeks coaches should stay off the court as much as possible to allow the game to flow but are permitted to walk up and down the court.

Year 4 team coaches should start to remain stationary by the second half of the season when the modified rules are progressed to full rules. This will mean they can no longer walk up and down the court.

According to Netball WA rules, players are required to call injury/illness time themselves, so once players are playing in the Year 5/6 competition, coaches should encourage them to call time themselves.

All coaches (from 2024) must have a minimum Foundation Coaching Accreditation. This is an online course provided by Netball Australia via the Netball Learning Centre.

Team Managers

Team Managers are an important part of any netball team. It is the team manager's responsibility to:

- Assist the coach as required
- Communicate with team members
- Score games, or coordinate scoring rosters for their team
- Be present at training wherever possible
- Arrange uniforms

Team Managers should be 18 years of age or older.

Parent/Guardian Responsibilities

Parents/Guardians are responsible for directly always supervising their children whilst attending an LNA Competition. For their own safety, children are not permitted on the court surface, including behind the goals. At times, the bottom courts (Courts 3 & 4) may not be in use by LNA. Parents are requested to advise their children that these courts are out of bounds as they are not monitored by LNA representatives during this time. Thank you for your cooperation.

Court Safety

Spectators are requested to remain off the courts during games. Spectators should be seated as far back from the sidelines as possible to allow umpires (and/or trainers) to move freely down the court.

Code of Conduct – Members & Spectators

LNA members & spectators are required to abide by our Code of Conduct Policy which outlines the expectations of all participants and spectators whilst attending an LNA Competition.

Persons in breach of our Code of Conduct will be issued with a warning and asked to adjust their behaviour, or for serious misconduct, may be asked to leave the centre.

Code of Conduct breaches by Players (which results in a suspension) shall have all MVP votes forfeited up to the time of their suspension.

Code of Conduct breaches will also incur penalties/fines as described in the By-laws.

Under NO CIRCUMSTANCES are any spectators, players, coaches, managers or other persons are to approach any LNA person be it a player, umpire, coach, spectator or other for the purpose of laying a complaint directed at them or someone else. Providing advice as to how to play etc is also not permitted unless it is the coach or team manager of a team providing such advice to their own players. Most LNA Members are children, and as such they can sometimes make an error in judgement. For this reason, all complaints must be directed to the LNA Supervisor on duty in the court box. A breach of this is considered a breach of LNA's code of conduct and shall be dealt with accordingly.

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Complaints

All complaints must be dealt with in accordance with LNA's Complaints Policy. Our full complaints policy and formal complaint form can be found on our website.

Club members must lodge complaints through their own club, and not directly to LNA. All complaints received by LNA which are initiated by a club team/player/member/spectator will be referred to the relevant club. The club will review the complaint and consider whether a formal complaint will be lodged with LNA.

LNA adopts a Complaints Committee comprising the President, Vice President, ADO & Umpire Coordinator. This committee convenes to investigate all formal complaints and determine the relevant outcome based on LNA policies, procedures and any relevant governing bodies policies and procedures.

LNA welcomes feedback involving umpires decisions, however NO FORMAL COMPLAINT will be accepted by the committee regarding umpires making decisions or mistakes whilst umpiring.

Umpires

LNA has an excellent umpire training and development program. Our aim is to develop our umpires in a friendly, safe environment whilst teaching them a range of skills from basic up to 'C' badge level. The umpires are mentored by our Badged Training Officers who are overseen by the Committee and our Umpiring Coordinator (AUDO). All umpires (unless already badged) must start at the 'Green Shirt' trainee level at LNA.

After meeting the minimum qualification process, 'Green Shirt' umpires will umpire on Saturday mornings and then progress through to Thursday night games and when competent enough Friday night games will be the next progression.

Once the AUDO certifies that the umpire meets the requirements of a 'Green Shirt Umpire' they progress to a 'Blue Shirt Umpire'.

All umpires must agree to and abide by the Umpires Code of Conduct and ensure all required components of LNA's umpiring program are met ie annual registration, rules of netball exam etc.

Getting Started as an Umpire

LNA accepts 6 new trainee umpires each year under a 'first in' basis for selection, with a minimum starting age of 12 years old. To register your interest in our umpiring program, you must first complete and pass the online 'Rules of Netball Exam' and send the certificate to LNA (leschenaultnetball@gmail.com). Upon receipt of the certificate, you will be added to the wait list to join our program. Please note that there could be a 2 year or more waiting period for this program.

Communication

We aim to provide our newsletter every month during the season, and two-three monthly in the off-season. This is a vital source of information, By-Laws and registration reminders, important dates and LNA news. Your feedback is always welcome!

Representative Netball

LNA offers Representative (aka Development) netball opportunities every year. To be eligible to participate in the Rep program at LNA, participants in U11, U12, U13 & U14 age groups must be playing at LNA within the domestic competition in either a club or entity team.

LNA understands that U16 & U20 players may not be playing in the domestic competition due to South West Netball/Football team commitments. LNA may therefore have different prerequisites for these players, provided they have played within an LNA Rep team in past years. Please refer to the current Representative Policy for clarification or discuss your situation with the Association Development Officer (ADO). For all age groups from U12-U16, participants must be available to play in both Championship Competitions (carnivals) in the same year. Association Championships are usually held in Perth on the June long weekend each year. This competition runs from Saturday through to the Monday Public Holiday. South West & Peel Regional Championships are usually held in late July over a Saturday and Sunday in Bunbury or Busselton.

Representative Netball is a level above club netball whereby players are coached by Development Accredited Coaches who have undertaken specialist training to enhance their players skill levels and tactical play. Players will trial within their age group and they are assessed against other participants trialling for a place in the program.

Our representative program is dependent on qualified coaches volunteering to coach a team or teams. Without coaches, we are unable to offer this program, so we recommend that parents seek to undertake their Development Coaching Accreditation as their child nears Representative Age (U11) to ensure that we have coaches willing to assist each year.

Representative (Rep) players train for 6-10 weeks from April/May until South West & Peel Regional Championships in July, usually with breaks for school holidays. These players are expected to attend most training sessions in order to keep their place in their Rep team.

There is an additional cost to be part of the Rep squad to cover court costs, uniform hire, carnival fees etc.

Our U11 players are usually invited to participate in our U11 Academy around June/July in readiness for a 'friendlies' carnival which is usually held in August each year. The commitment for these players is much less, as the carnival is all about participation and fun, and giving the players a 'taste' of Rep netball in a far more informal environment.

Sponsorship

LNA is a not-for-profit organisation, and hence we rely on fundraising efforts to gather additional revenue to keep our fees as low as possible and/or to fund special activities or purposes.
